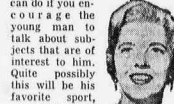

Drops Indiana souvenir into the Pacific Ocean

NOTRE DAME, Ind.—Floating in the Pacific Ocean is a replica of the Seal of St. Mary's College, Notre Dame, Indiana. Only a few weeks ago it was tossed overboard by Miss Sarah Anne Patterson and her St. Mary's shipmates as they, and some recent graduates from the University of Notre Dame, crossed the equator while en route to their Peace Corps assignments in Chile.

It was quite an affair—she must have had the Seal of St. Mary's College and Notre Dame emblem and waved the banner Sister Marie Rosaire gave me and the "Victory" flag. I don't feel we must have set a precedent.

In a long letter recently received by Sister Maria Peta, C.S.C., the college's executive vice president, Miss Patterson included this paragraph: "Did I tell you on the post card (received earlier) about our quorum crossing ceremony where we threw a replica of the St. Mary's seal into the water in...

Giving a port-by-port account of her itinerary, Sister Patterson's letter—of its first impressions only—was written shortly after arrival at her destination, Lo Vasquez, a Peace Corps training station not far from Valparaiso. There she and her conferees will remain until reassignments on November 20.

In the United States there is no forced labor within the meaning of the convention so that ratification of the convention would have no direct effect in this country. For this reason, together with broad policy against unnecessarily entering into treaties relating exclusively to internal matters, there was a real question whether the United States should support the forced labor convention in the ILO conference. In fact, the decision at the 1957 conference to do so did much to put a stop to malicious gossip that the United States had skeletons in its closet in the form of forced labor practices.

13-century-old prayer opens Council meetings

VATICAN CITY — The same prayer which opened the sessions of the First Vatican Council in 1869 is being used before every meeting in preparation for the Second Vatican Council.

The prayer was used during the Second Provincial Council of Seville, Spain, in 619, and during the Fourth Provincial Council of Toledo, Spain, in 633. It is believed that it was composed by St. Isidore of Seville for that purpose.

The Latin text of the prayer has opened every meeting of the preparatory commissions and secretariats for the past year and is currently being recited before the meetings of the Central Preparatory Commission. In all probability, it will continue to be used before the meetings of the future ecumenical council.

It goes as follows: "We are here before You, O Holy Spirit, conscious of our innumerable sins, but united in a special way in Your Holy Name. Come and abide with us. Design to penetrate our hearts."

AT SECOND MEETING

Council Commission explores major issues

VATICAN CITY—Members of the Central Preparatory Commission for the forthcoming Ecumenical Council have studied the following major matters at their second meeting: a better distribution of the clergy, a new definition of the sources of Revelation, a new formula for the profession of faith, and the question of inviting non-Catholics to the council.

Commission members took a vote on the question of inviting non-Catholics to be council observers, but did not disclose the result. After several Rome papers had claimed the vote was favorable, the Commission's press office issued a statement saying the reports were premature and that, in any event, the final decision was the Pope's.

The proposals on the sources of Revelation and on the profession of faith appeared by their nature to have been related to projects submitted by the Preparatory Commission on Theology.

THE PROPOSAL of a new formula for the profession of faith was introduced by Cardinal Alfredo Ottaviani, secretary of the Sacred Congregation of the Holy Office. The main issue here was the question of combining the present formula with the oath against Modernism.

The profession of faith would be nothing new in the Church. Canon law now requires that it

be pronounced by certain individuals as they enter positions of responsibility where matters of Faith are involved. Among these are candidates for promotion to the College of Cardinals and to the episcopacy, and candidates for the priesthood. Pastors and certain seminary professors are also required to pronounce it.

The most immediate application of the new formula would be in the council itself. All persons with a decisive or even a consultative vote would be required to take it.

The draft for a constitution on the sources of Revelation would touch on the teachings of the Church itself.

In the language of the council, the word "constitution" would mean a document containing a definition of truths pertaining to the Faith. This would distinguish it from a "decretum" which would refer to documents declaring disciplinary decisions.

The word "Revelation" here would refer to the truths revealed by God to man. In the Catholic Church the sources of supernatural Revelation are held to be the Sacred Scriptures and tradition. The proposed constitution would clarify the Church's teaching in these matters.

PROPOSED legislation which would create a better distribution of the clergy to meet shifts in population, and extraordinary needs in certain areas, was under examination. It was submitted by the Preparatory Commission for the Discipline of the Clergy and Christian People.

The proposal was presented by Cardinal Pietro Ciriaci, president of that commission. Discussion that followed was chiefly on the canon law provisions that govern the engaging (incardination) of priests in dioceses and their release (excardination) to other dioceses.

Throughout its work the Central Commission followed the rules of procedure that it had established for itself in its June assemblies. The meetings were presided over by His Holiness Pope John XXIII or in his absence, by the senior Cardinal. Cardinal Eugene Tisserant served in this capacity in the Pope's absence this week.

EACH ASSEMBLY began with an outline of the questions on the agenda for that particular meeting. Then the secretary general, Archbishop Pericle Felici, read the project or brief submitted by a particular preparatory commission. The president of the preparatory commission whose project had been read then explained and explained the various elements of the project. After this came the questions, discussion and final vote.

Central Commission members had three possible votes: "placet," or approved; "non placet," disapproved; "placet iuxta modum," approved with reservations.

Projects are approved by a two-thirds vote, unless the Pope establish otherwise.
